Rod Allman is a Trustee and Honorary Lecture Secretary of the Manchester Geographical Society; he has served as Chairman and President. Before retiring he was a Senior Lecturer at Manchester Metropolitan University where he specialized in the human aspects of geography and served for a spell as geography course leader. Earlier in his career, he taught geography in secondary schools before moving into teacher education and training.

Andrew Binder is a senior sustainable transport planner working for Mouchel (part of the WSP Group). As a part-time PhD student at the University of Salford, his research includes investigation of opportunities to influence travel behaviour during large-scale relocation of the workforce to MediaCityUK at Salford Quays.

Derek Brumhead worked in adult education in Manchester for nearly 20 years before becoming administrator of New Mills Heritage Centre, from which he now is retired. He was awarded an MBE in 2004 for his work on New Mills heritage. With Terry Wyke, he wrote “A Walk around All Saints” and “A Walk around Castlefield”. Cathy Delaney is a Trustee of the Manchester Geographical Society. She is a Senior Lecturer in Physical Geography at Manchester Metropolitan University, specialising in glaciology. Her interests include glacial landforms and deposits formed during deglaciation, particularly ice-contact glaciofluvial landforms (eskers) and proglacial lake sediments. She has worked in Ireland, the United Kingdom, France, Spain and Iceland.

Before taking very early retirement he was a Senior Lecturer at the University of Salford, and was Geography Course Tutor for 13 years. He has wide research and teaching interests and has written 10 Books, 7 chapters in books and over 150 articles.

Richard Knowles is Emeritus Professor of Transport Geography at the University of Salford, Chair of the International Geographical Union's Commission on Transport and Geography, and Founding Editor of the Journal of Transport Geography. His research focuses on the impacts of transport infrastructure investments, transport privatisation and deregulation. He has published 7 books and numerous research papers, book chapters and reports.
